# FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK...

Darke County Parks recently lost a true Friend of the Park District. John Ball was a shining example of

what volunteerism is about. He understood how important it is, to not only the Park District but also to the personal satisfaction in the life of the volunteer. When I first arrived in Darke County in



December of 2002, John was one of the first volunteers to introduce himself and offer his assistance to help me become acquainted. John served on the Friends of the Darke County Parks Board of Trustees, the Endowment Committee, and was always available to volunteer and fill in where needed, even filling in at the front desk to answer the phone on an occasional Saturday afternoon. I remember John most vividly sitting in the shade with his hat on, welcoming people to the Darke County Parks Annual Prairie Days event as they would board the horse and wagon tour for a ride around Shawnee Prairie Preserve. He understood the people of Darke County and especially those families that would visit the Nature Center at Shawnee Prairie. He would comment on how important this facility was to the youth so that they were introduced to the precious natural and cultural treasures of Darke County. He called them our keepers and stewards of tomorrow. John's insight into life was always welcome. I was continually amazed at his calm demeanor and how infectious that calmness was to others. This was truly an asset to be noted. His humorous wit always showed when most needed, especially at long drawn out or contentious Friends of the Parks meetings, when he would shout "Motion to Adjourn" just at the right time.

As a personal note, on countless occasions John and I would have lunch together, usually on Thursdays, and at one of the diners in town that John liked to frequent. He always insisted that it was his turn to pick up the tab. I learned not argue that point. Our conversation was not always related to Park District business but on most occasions it was about leadership in life. His stories of serving in two wars were always inspiring and never without meaning. I will miss those lunches. If my memory serves me, John was a paratrooper and very proud of that fact. John has made that final "jump" and even though he is gone from amongst us, his teachings and camaraderie will linger for generations to come. I salute my friend for his service to Country and Community.

Every Friday through September 30 @ 2pm Shawnee Prairie Preserve



inches, the tree's estimated age was over 260 years old. To put that into perspective, our Sycamore tree was well past its teens when the Declaration of Independence was signed.

However impressive this particular tree may be though, it is far from a record. The state of Ohio is actually home to the National Champion Sycamore. This true giant has a circumference of 588 inches (49ft), which makes our 'little' tree look downright petite in comparison. Even so, to find a tree of that age in an area of the state that has been extensively farmed for so long is a unique glimpse into the natural history of the region. As Sycamores prefer moist, well drained soils, this tells us that even in 1750 there was an easily obtainable water source on site, most likely a younger Kraut Creek. This in turn offers a possible explanation as to why the tree was never cleared for agriculture: the soil stayed too wet to farm. Even more information could be gathered from the trees growth rings if a cross-section of the trunk or bore sample were taken. Besides the exact age, climatic conditions for the past 200 years could be determined by an examination of the width of the individual growth rings. Wider rings would determine years where optimal weather conditions permitted more rapid growth, and more narrow rings indicate the inverse. A specialist could certainly gather more information but this is just one example of how something as common place as a Sycamore tree has a story as unique and valuable as any found in nature. So next time you're out for a walk on one of the trails, take your time to observe some of the marvelous pieces of natural history that are being preserved here. Who knows what story they might have to tell.

As the summer intern here with Darke County Parks, I am looking forward to working with all the great people that can be found within the many facets of the Park District. My name is Aaron Coons and I was born and raised here in Darke County, graduating from Versailles High School. Next spring I will be graduating with an Associate's Degree in Wildlife Sciences from Hocking College before continuing my education towards a Bachelor's Degree in Biological Sciences.

My time here with the Naturalist staff will be spent helping with the many youth summer camps the Parks host, as well as some involvement in specific evening programs.

In addition, I will be cataloging the flora and fauna within the parks to help the District gain a better insight into the biological makeup of each Park, keeping a special eye out for any unique, rare, or invasive species. Through this cataloging the Park District will be able to better monitor the succession of the Parks and any new plant or animal arrivals that may be of importance. By spending the summer here I hope to both refine and enhance my understanding of the flora and fauna commonly found in the area. I also look forward to working more directly with the public, be it through educational evening programs or the youth summer camps, to help


