

Emergency Drills

At East Intermediate, students work on emergency drills. These include fire drills, tornado drills, lock downs and evacuations.

When there is a fire drill, the principal rings a bell and students go outside to a safe area. Then the teachers take attendance and if everybody is there, the teachers hold up a green sign. If someone is missing, the teachers hold up a red sign and adults locate the missing student.

When there is a tornado drill, the principal sounds a horn, and then students get away from windows and duck. They cover their heads. Some teachers evacuate their classrooms and take their students to safer rooms.

When there is a lockdown due to an intruder, the principal says, "We are having a lockdown." Then we all follow lockdown procedures. While students do that, teachers lock the doors and close the windows and blinds. When the lockdown is done, the principal says, "We are finished with our lockdown."

When there is an evacuation drill due to a bomb threat, the principal tells us to evacuate the building. Students and teachers walk to a nearby location. When the threat is over, everyone returns to school.

It is important to practice these drills to keep everyone safe.

BLIZZARDS & SNOWSTORMS

It's cold here in the Weather Corner today. I'll be giving you some useful tips about blizzards and snowstorms. I'll also be telling you how to prepare for winter weather .Have fun reading, and have a safe winter!

Who do you call if you get caught in a snowstorm?

If you get caught in a snowstorm, you call 911.

What are level 1, 2, and 3 snow emergencies?

Level one: Roads are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads also have ice. Drive cautiously!

Level two: Roads are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads are *very icy*.Drive *cautiously*.

Level three: All roadways are closed except for emergency vehicles. Others driving may be *arrested*.

What kinds of supplies should you always have in your car in winter?

You need a winter survival kit:

Blankets/sleeping bags First-aid kit

Knife

High-calorie non-perishable food

Extra clothing to keep dry

Shovel

Windshield scraper brush

Toolkit

Container of water

Compass and road maps

What conditions are necessary to cause meteorologists to declare that the weather qualifies as a blizzard?

Winds above 35 miles per hour

Temperature under minus 7 degrees Celsius

Your ability to see beyond 400 meters ahead of yourself is impossible for at least 3 hours.
